

- Theme- Students have been asking questions about our school building. They want to know the height of the building, what it's made of and how strong it is. They also ask many questions about the way it looks. Their ongoing interest in our building helped the preschool team realize that buildings would make a good study topic. For the next three weeks, we will be learning about buildings. Our first investigation included: What do the buildings in our neighborhood and other places look like? Do you live in a house, apartment, condo, etc? We discussed the following about buildings: Color, shape, height and other features. Next week we will be discussing, Who builds buildings? What tools do they use? What are buildings made of?
- SEL- Students reviewed different feelings they can have in response to scenarios.
- Handwriting Without Tears- Students are using roll-a-dough & magnet letters to learn to form each letter.
- Literacy- Students will be retelling the "Three Billy Goats Gruff" and the "Three Little Pigs" story. Students are also identifying capital and lowercase letters throughout the classroom.
- Math- Students are matching shapes of a different size. Students are also focusing on identifying each shape and how many sides each shape has.

K

- In Literacy we are becoming experts on explaining how we know if a book is Fiction or Nonfiction.
- We are working hard to learn all 40 kindergarten sight words.
- In Math we have started our unit on composing and decomposing teen numbers

- Literacy: We are focusing on consonant blends, spelling trickier high frequency words, journeys near and far, problem and solution situations, and mysteries!
- Writing: We are writing animal informative booklets! We have been using technology devices and books to help research where animals live, what they eat, and how they look!
- Math: We have recently finished our topic on adding with tens and ones. We are moving into subtracting with tens and ones. Using strategies and tools such as the 120 Chart, tens and ones mats, and mental math have been very helpful for us as we explore these topics.
- Social Sciences: We just finished our unit on sound and vibrations. We are moving into our scope on different ways to use communication!

- Literacy/Social Studies: Ms. Ferguson has been studying simple Biographies, while Ms. Ohlson & Miss Maciulewicz are finishing their unit on American symbols and will be moving into author study
- Math: Money (coin recognition, how much each is worth and counting change)
- Writing: Opinion and informative writing
- Science: Mapping our world with landforms, erosion, quick and slow changes to land

- Reading: Finishing Diversity Unit, starting Freedom Unit / Judy Blume Author Study
- Writing: Narrative Process Papers
- Math: Geometry / Area and Perimeter
- Social Studies: Public Services / City Hall
- Science: Weather / Processes and Impacts of Natural Hazards

- Reading: Mrs. Flanagan's students are continuing to work through Unit 6: Confronting Challenges. They are working on making connections. Miss. Parker and Mrs. Akert's students are Finishing Unit 5 with the story *Moonwalk* and working on drawing conclusions.
- Writing: Miss. Parker and Mrs. Akert's students are working on their Informative process papers/ Mrs. Flanagan's students are working on Narrative Journal Entry.
- Math: Students are mastering the addition and subtraction of mixed numbers, and multiplication of whole numbers and fractions.
- Social Studies: *Up Next*; Midwest/Chicago Unit
- Science: Students have been exploring renewable and nonrenewable Resources.



- Reading: Mrs. Petschinsky's class is continuing to work through Unit 6 answering the essential question: What compels us to survive? Miss Chernesky/ Mrs. Bautista and Mrs. Carbonara's will begin their last novel study discussing the theme of survival.
- Writing: Miss Chernesky/Mrs. Bautista and Mrs. Carbonara's classes are creating informative essays about an influential person in history. Mrs. Petschinsky's class is working on Narrative Journal Entries. Biography people visual aides are due May 10th for all classes.
- Math: Our next unit will be focusing on numerical expressions, patterns, and relationships.
- Social Studies: We will begin learning about the Declaration of Independence and the Revolutionary War.
- Science: Next up we will start a unit on human development.

MUSIC AT MEDINAH

Kindergarten

- Labeled loud and soft music with the dynamics *piano* and *forte*
- Explored high and low pitches set a perfect fifth apart

1st Grade

- Read, wrote, and composed with the pitches *so-mi* on the music staff
- Discovered a new rhythm that we are currently calling a "silent beat"

2nd Grade

- Performed and identified a new rhythm in many known songs that is worth two beats
- Discovered that there is a pitch lower than *mi*
- Completed their unit of the instruments of the orchestra

3rd Grade

- Improvised and composed melodies with the pitches *do-mi-so-la*
- Experienced and identified the unknown rhythm "pepperoni" in many known songs
- Began labelling note names in treble clef

4th Grade

- Labeled a new pitch that is lower than *low la*, known as *low so*.
- Learned the fingerings for three new pitches on the recorder: C, D, and B.

5th Grade

- Labeled the pitch *fa*, and discovered that it is a half-step away from *mi*.
- Performed, identified, and labeled a new uneven rhythm called syncopation.

Mr. B's Kitchen

Fire up that grill for some Caprese Asprages!

- 1 lb. asparagus, stalks trimmed
- Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling
- kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 2 c. shredded mozzarella
- 2 c. cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1/2 c. balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 c. honey
- Thinly sliced fresh basil, for garnish



DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 425°. On a large baking sheet, toss asparagus with olive oil and season with salt and pepper.
2. Push to one side of the baking sheet and sprinkle mozzarella on top.

3. On the other side of the baking sheet, toss cherry tomatoes with olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Bake until the asparagus is tender and the cheese has melted, about 20 minutes.
4. Meanwhile, make balsamic glaze: In a small saucepan, combine balsamic vinegar and honey. Simmer until reduced by half, stirring occasionally, 15 minutes (the mixture should coat the back of a spoon). Let cool slightly.
5. Transfer cheesy asparagus to a serving platter. Top with roasted tomatoes then drizzle with balsamic glaze and garnish with basil

Building Reading Stamina
